Over 16,000 books donated to SJCL

San Joaquin College of Law received a gift to the SJCL Law Library of nearly 16,500 volumes worth \$550,000.

hen San Joaquin College of Law Board Chair Doug Noll flew to Wichita, Kansas in April to deliver the first annual Garvey Lecture at Friends University, little did he know that he would return with a gift of nearly 16,500 volumes to the SJCL Law Library. The gift, worth an estimated \$550,000, came from Presidents College of Law which closed in 2001.

In the course of his visit to Friends, Noll met Dixie Madden, currently Director of the Garvey Institute of Law at Friends University, and formerly Dean of Presidents College of Law. He learned of Presidents' closure May to evaluate which volumes should be accepted for the SJCL collection.

The gift includes 200 different law review titles, most from the first volume of their publication, from law schools throughout the United States. A law review collection of this kind is mandated for ABA accreditation, as well as being an important resource for local scholars and practitioners. The collection also includes state reporters from years before the creation of the National Reporter System. Many of these volumes date from the 1800's and are an invaluable historical addition to SJCL's collection. Most of the

not accessible through any computer research system. The gift also included 224 library shelving units.

This gift brings the SJCL collection to nearly 50,000 volumes. The SJCL Library has been physically reorganized to house these volumes and the anticipated growth of the law reviews. SJCL is extremely grateful to Presidents College for this wonderful addition to its library. The City of Clovis and the Clovis Memorial District have generously provided additional storage space for books

and shelves.

J.D. & Peacemaking co-operative degree

JCL and Fresno Pacific University (FPU) have created their first cooperative degree program. The announcement of the program featured the signing of the cooperative agreement between the two institutions in a ceremony at FPU. Upon successful completion of the program, the graduate earns both a Juris Doctorate and a Master of Arts in Peacemaking and Conflict Studies.

This cooperative degree program is unique in the world. It seeks to add a new set of skills to the lawyer's toolbox for resolving conflict and thus expand the employment opportunities for lawyers. In the Juris Doctorate program students are trained to understand conflict in terms of rights, responsibilities, and remedies and manage them through the legal system. This approach works well for some conflict, but fails in others, often leaving all parties dissatisfied with the outcomes. It has also overburdened the court system. The Masters in Peacemaking

and Conflict Studies trains students to understand conflict from a multidisciplinary perspective, drawing on conflict theory, social psychology, neurophysiology, religion, and sociology. It teaches collaborative processes to restore relationships, where possible, as well as resolve rights.

Earning both degrees separately from each institution would require a student to take 126 units, 86 at SJCL and 40 at FPU. Under the cooperative

program, the student takes 108 units, 80 at SJCL and 28 at FPU. Students simultaneously enrolled in both degree programs can complete both degrees in four years attending full-time and five years attending part-time because of the mutual recognition of elective units.

This cooperative degree program puts SJCL students on the cutting edge of training in dispute resolution and conflict management.

Roger J. Traynor Moot Court Competition

Por the fourth year in a row San Joaquin College of Law students placed in the top three in the state wide Roger J. Traynor Moot Court Competition. This year's par-

ticipants Zepure Attashian, Mark Roy and Greg Miskulin, won third place in the Best Brief category. Mark Roy also received an award as Outstanding Oral Advocate.

The annual competition, sponsored by the Witkin Legal Institute, was developed by the California Young Lawyers Association to provide students with a contemporary legal exercise. It focuses on written

and oral arguments about a real case at the appellate court level. This year's showing by San Joaquin College of Law establishes, once again, that it continues to produce law students who excel in both the oral and written competitions.

The team competed against 17 schools including UC Davis, UC Hastings, Pepperdine, and UC Los Angeles.

The Moot Court competition was named after Roger J. Traynor, a well-known and respected California Supreme Court Justice, who served on the court from 1940-1970.


Graduation




