Tuition Refund Policy - Drop Policy

Only classes dropped on or before 5:00p, September 08, 2026 are eligible for a tuition refund.

Schedule Change Fee

A student may make a change (add and/or drop a class or change sections if permissible) after the close of Registration without a fee by notifying the Registrar before 5:00p, August 21, 2026 via email.

After 5p, August 22, 2026, a \$25.00 Schedule Change Fee for each add/drop form submitted will be assessed for any changes (add/drops) to your schedule through September 08, 2026 (excluding clinical units.) A Schedule Change Fee will not be assessed for Administrative Withdrawals.

Withdrawal Policy

Students who completely withdraw from school on or before October 14, 2026 are eligible for a partial refund of tuition. For complete details see the “Dropping a Class and the Complete Withdrawal Refund Policy” section in the Student Handbook.

Deferred Payments (Returning Students Only)

Tuition deferrals are available for special circumstances and are approved on a case-by-case basis. Contact Jill Randles at 559/323-2100 prior to August 10, 2026 to make arrangements.

Financial Aid

Students who have completed the financial aid process will not be required to pay tuition and fees at the time of registration. Tuition and fee charges will be deducted from your financial aid disbursement when it is posted to your student account. If the disbursement results in excess cash in your account, a check will be issued to you within 7 days. If your financial aid disbursement does not cover all of your charges, you must pay the difference in full by 4:15p, August 21, 2026. Contact the Financial Aid Office ASAP (lnilmeier@sjcl.edu) for help completing the application process or if you are unsure of your financial aid status.

Important notice for all students receiving financial aid for fall term
You must be enrolled in at least 5 units to receive financial aid for the fall term.
You may not qualify for financial aid if you are enrolled only for non-classroom units (e.g. clinical, internship, independent study, etc.). See Lisa Nilmeier in the Financial Aid Office for details.

Attendance and Preparedness Policy

Modalities

SJCL offers two methods (“modalities”) of attendance: in-person and through the remote option. Before the start of each semester, students will be required to elect a modality on a course-by-course basis. Students do not need to select the same modality for all courses in a given semester. However, once a modality is selected, students must attend all class sessions for that particular course in the chosen modality unless the student is using a Flex Day.

Students will have two weeks from the start of the course to request attendance modality changes (Fall and Spring) and one week for the Summer term. After this time, modality changes will only be made upon a showing of exigent circumstances. This ensures professors have realistic expectations regarding the ratio of in-person versus remote students and allows them to adjust teaching methods if necessary.

Attendance Records

The Professor will take roll electronically for each class. The professor is responsible for marking students 1) virtually present, 2) physically present, or 3) absent. The Law Coordinator maintains class attendance records; however, students are responsible for keeping track of their own absences.

Students may view the absences recorded by professors and submitted to the Law Coordinator through the student portal. However, if an attendance sheet has not been submitted, the student's full record of absences will not be reflected. As a result, students should not rely upon the student portal's attendance records and should contact the Law Coordinator with questions.

Maximum Absences and Flex Days

The SJCL attendance policy is based on the Committee of Bar Examiners' requirement that all students attend at least 80% of scheduled classes to receive credit for a course. Faculty members may impose more stringent attendance requirements for a particular class by giving enrolled students reasonable advance notice of their specific attendance policy.

For each course, students are permitted a certain number of days (“Flex Days”) which allows them to be marked present if they attend in the non-selected modality. If a student has used all allotted Flex Days, students must attend the remainder of classes in their chosen Modality or they will be marked absent.

Unless a professor adopts a different policy, students are permitted the following number of absences and flex days per course per semester, regardless of the reason for the absence:

Administrative Withdrawal

Students should take care to use absences only in cases of illness, medical care, family emergencies, or other exigent circumstances. Any student who exceeds the number of absences permitted for a course will be administratively withdrawn from the course. The student will receive a refund of the unearned tuition consistent with the applicable SJCL drop or withdrawal refund policy. A student who is administratively withdrawn from a course due to excessive absences may suffer delayed graduation, loss of financial aid, or other adverse consequences.

Petitioning for Reinstatement

Within one week after being informed of administrative withdrawal, a student may petition for reinstatement in the course. Such petitions are adjudicated by a subcommittee comprised of the Academic Dean or Dean of Students and two members of the Faculty Committee, selected on a rotating basis. Petitions for reinstatement must address the reason for each class absence, not just the final absence. Relevant documentation of the grounds asserted as good cause is required.

When a Student may be Deemed Absent

Students must come to class on time and prepared, having completed all assigned readings. Students will be deemed absent when missing a substantial portion of class. Whether a student has missed a substantial portion of class is within the discretion of the instructor and is based on a variety of factors, including the total class time and content missed. For remote students, logging onto zoom with a video off or using a photo or avatar is not sufficient to be considered present; virtual students must be visible on camera. A professor who determines a student to be unprepared may deem the student absent. The deemed absence for unpreparedness or for missing a substantial portion of class time will be treated the same as an absence for not being physically present.

Standards for Remote Attendance

Students attending remotely are responsible for having reliable Wi-Fi, microphone, and video conferencing capabilities. Using a photo or avatar will not suffice for video. Students must be prepared, ready to answer questions when called on, and willing to engage in the class activities. Students who do not appear on video with audio capability for all or a substantial part of a scheduled class session or are engaged in non-class activities (conversations with household members, driving, exercising, etc.) for a substantial portion of time will be marked absent.

Virtual learners are held to the same etiquette standards as in-person students and are expected to maintain professionalism, including dressing in attire appropriate for an in-person classroom. Students attending remotely should observe the following best practices.

- **Test your zoom settings.** Ensure your device is plugged in and properly functioning before every class session. Test your camera, microphone, and speakers in advance. Contact the SJCL Help Desk immediately if any issues arise at [SJCL Help Desk](#)
- **Identify yourself.** Virtual learners must display their full name. To create a safe space and inclusive environment for all, students are encouraged to add pronouns to their zoom profiles: <https://support.zoom.us/hc/en-us/articles/4402698027533>

- **Identify a working area.** Take into consideration lighting, noise, and potential distractions. To avoid distractions, consider turning off unnecessary notifications, closing open windows and apps, and putting away your phone during class. Position yourself where the brightest light source in the room is in front of you to avoid backlighting and to ensure you are visible. The video filters in Zoom can correct for color tones in your room lighting.
- **Consider using a zoom background.** Zoom and SJCL offer virtual backgrounds that work on many devices. To view and download the SJCL Zoom background collection Click [HERE](#) If you are not using a virtual background, ensure that any items that appear behind you are professional and not distracting for the instructor or other students.
- **Practice professionalism and be respectful of your instructors and classmates.** Keep in mind that classmates and instructors can see you at all times. Avoid eyerolling, inappropriate laughter or gesturing, audible sighing, etc. Refrain from multitasking, exercising, driving, laying down, texting, and conversing for more than a few moments with other individuals in your home. These activities are distracting to others and indicate that you are not giving class your full attention. Wear appropriate attire. Clothing you would not wear to an in-person class (such as pajamas) is not appropriate.
- **Use the chat feature appropriately.** Ask your professor whether they will be monitoring the chat window, and keep in mind that even if you message the professor directly on chat, the message will be visible to in-person students. The chat window should be used only for class-related discussions—comments, sharing of resources, etc.—except for casual conversations at the start and end of class. Keep remarks on-topic and courteous.
- **Participate and engage.** You must be prepared, ready to answer questions when called on, and willing to engage in class activities. You are encouraged to ask questions, volunteer responses, and form connections with other students.

Student Identification Card

By accepting an SJCL ID card, the **recipient agrees to notify the SJCL Helpdesk in the event that an ID card is found, stolen or lost.** To avoid any unauthorized access to the building, such notification must be effectuated in a timely fashion so the card can be deactivated. Recording Lectures and Other Classroom Activities

Most lectures and other classroom technologies are automatically recorded by SJCL through Zoom, consistent with our Lecture Recordings policy and the policies of Zoom. The use of any other technologies for audio and video recording of lectures and other classroom activities, whether in-person or online, is strictly forbidden unless the student has received the express written permission of the Law School Coordinator for student disability accommodations. In cases where recordings are allowed, the use of such recordings must be restricted to that which is allowed in our Lecture Recordings Policy.

Approved recordings of classes will only be arranged by SJCL's IT Department. The availability of classroom recordings for any reason does not alter SJCL's policies requiring regular and punctual attendance.

Lecture Recordings Policy

Class recordings generated by SJCL are restricted to students currently enrolled in the class and are for personal use only. Personal use is defined as the use by an individual student to study or complete course assignments. Class recordings may not be copied or used to create derivative works, and may not be uploaded to any third-party platform, including generative artificial intelligence systems or other platform [that retains or uses the recordings beyond the student's private personal use]. Any misuse or improper sharing of recordings will result in an honor code violation. In addition, students are strictly forbidden from conducting any separate recording of lectures, except as permitted in the policy on Recording Lectures and Other Classroom Activities.

Academic Counseling

SJCL students have the right to obtain academic counseling from the faculty at times and through means that are reasonably accessible and convenient to students. Because of SJCL's anonymous grading policy, faculty are not aware of which students receive accommodations. Accordingly, students seeking classroom recordings as a disability accommodation must do so by coordinating with the Law School Coordinator. For students who have been approved for audio and/or video recording of lectures and other classroom activities as a reasonable accommodation for a disability, applicable federal law requires professors to permit those recordings. Such recordings are also limited to personal use, except with permission of the professor and other students in the class.

L225 Civil Trial Practice (3 units)

Instructor: Craig Waters

This course will provide a hands-on approach to learning the basics of civil jury trial practice and is designed for students looking to gain practical knowledge prior to working in a civil litigation firm. Class sessions will involve learning how to prepare and present a civil jury trial from jury instructions to closing arguments. Students will work with case materials to prepare witnesses, conduct direct and cross-examinations, and present their arguments in front of a jury. Upon completion of the course, students should feel confident in their ability to perform civil trial work.

Evidence is strongly recommended. Pass/Fail

Limited to 16 students

L218 Dispute Resolution (3 units)

Instructor: Lee Jacobson

Due to the large amount of class time to be devoted to mediation role playing, it is **HIGHLY ENCOURAGED** that all students choosing to enroll in this course commit to in person classroom attendance for all class sessions.

This course employs doctrinal and hands-on approaches to teach students how to apply i) state-of-the-art subject matter expertise and ii) long tested mediation strategies to resolve personal injury claims. It will guide participants through the evolution of California Statutory and Case Law and explores how evaluation of evidentiary and monetary risks faced by the parties work to incentivize mutually satisfactory resolution. Topics to be addressed include:

- 1) Key provisions of California Tort and Insurance Law impacting on liability and damage issues;
- 2) Key provisions of California Civil Procedure Law impacting case valuation/ exposure and potential net recovery;
- 3) Identification and discussion of risk issues present in personal injury litigation;
- 4) Effective mediation advocacy by all mediation participants (counsel, clients, real parties in interest, and the mediator) to reduce the potential for negotiation impasse.

This course is highly interactive with plenty of opportunities to engage in role-playing exercises designed to allow class participants to experience the mediation process in a real time setting.

Students will be able to download and utilize material which will contain a collection of important Statutes and Case Law. **Class Size Limited to 12**

L215 Employment Law (2 units)

Instructor: Ryan Eddings

This course provides a comprehensive survey of California employment law, with a focus on the private-sector employment relationship. Students will examine the legal framework governing the employer-employee relationship from formation through termination, including classification issues, wage and hour requirements, leaves of absence, anti-discrimination and anti-harassment law, retaliation protections, and workplace policies. The course emphasizes California-specific statutes, regulations, and case law, while noting relevant federal law and traditional labor principles where applicable.

L241 Human Trafficking (2 units)

Instructor: Mikko Anderson

This course will be an in-depth and comprehensive exploration of the complex issues related to the growing international and domestic problem of human trafficking.

Covering both labor and sex trafficking, the material will explore current federal and state law, policy considerations, and significant legislative and societal changes related to the crime of human trafficking.

The student will be introduced to the industries wherein cases of human trafficking are commonly found, recruitment tactics of traffickers, as well as the “profiles” of traffickers, victims and buyers.

Through the lens of actual human trafficking prosecutions, students will examine the challenges found in the identification, investigation and prosecution of these cases. Student will be exposed to the unique dynamic between victim and trafficker, the perplexing occurrence of victims who become perpetrators, modern trends in human trafficking, such as the increase of female sex trafficker and the ever-changing use of social media, and victim centered approaches to prosecutions.

The course will also address the psychological, physical and financial impact of human trafficking on victims.

The teaching methods will include lectures, discussion and guest speakers.

Case studies will be in a multimedia format. The student will be presented with actual communications

L203 Legal Process (3 units)

Instructor: Full-Time Faculty

The course will focus on skills and knowledge useful for success on the California Bar Examination. Students will be exposed to bar-style essay exams, MBE exams and Performance Exams. Students will also receive some substantive review in Torts, Contracts and Constitutional Law.

Enrollment will be limited to students graduating in 2027.

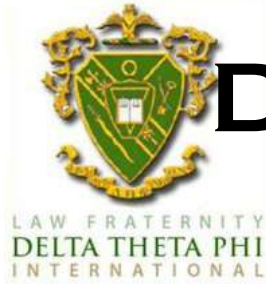
