## Herbert Foundation Pledges Lead Gift

The largest gift to date for San Joaquin College of Law's Capital Campaign was announced on February 20, 1996. The General James K. Herbert Foundation pledged \$125,000 toward the campaign's \$750,000 goal.

Brigadier General James K. Herbert (1909-1990) retired from the Army in 1946 and joined, as an executive, Schenley Corporation's Roma Wine Division located in Fresno. Upon resigning in 1957, he became active in farming, banking and real estate in the San Joaquin Valley. He served two terms as President of the Fresno Chamber of Commerce, twelve years as a Director of St. Agnes Medical Center, and Finance Chairman and Director of the Sequoia Council of the Boy Scouts of America.

The Foundation just completed its gift of \$3 million in a \$11 million campaign for the Alumni Center at West Point where General James K. Herbert received his education. "The Foundation is now turning its support to the local community and an institution where the General's daughter-in-law was dean and the General's son taught," stated James K. Herbert, Jr. "The General believed in the San Joaquin Valley, and the many resources that it had to offer. One of those resources is San Joaquin College of Law."

James K. Herbert, Jr. currently serves on the Law School's Board of Trustees. Herbert and his wife, Carol Sellers Herbert, sponsor a scholarship for a SJCL law student each year. The Herberts also have endowed the James K. and Carol Sellers Herbert Constitutional Law Chair since 1993.

"With this gift," Kristin Robinson, Associate Dean for Advancement stated, "we are a little more than halfway though the campaign, and we look forward to the entire community supporting the project—from those that might have fond memories of attending high school at the building to those who we serve through such projects as the San Joaquin Agricultural Law Review."

"The large gifts are important and essential in any campaign, but San Joaquin College of Law appreciates the support that it has received from so many individuals," Robinson continued.

"Corporate and foundation proposals look at percentages—for the support shown by the community, and that is what makes larger gifts such as this possible."

## Janice L. Pearson



It takes a lot of quiet, on-going effort to make a non-profit educational institution like SJCL work. The principal architect of this effort is the faculty. Being a SJCL faculty member is not simply a matter of droning away in front of a group of students once or more a week. It entails hours of preparation, *days* of grading exams, and constant searching for that magic way to convey the skill of analytical thinking. Not only do SJCL faculty succeed at this extraordinarily well, they also shoulder the same curricular development and administrative responsibilities borne by faculty at enormous institutions.

During my years at SJCL, I have been profoundly impressed with how seriously both adjunct and full-time faculty take their commitment to teaching. In fact, it often inspired me to "hang on" when times were tough. Some examples:

As Associate Dean for Academic Affairs, Sally Perring carries our typical 12-15 semester units per year teaching load. She also is responsible for all course planning and scheduling, faculty governance, curricular review, law faculty hiring and evaluation, policy drafting and advising the San Joaquin Agricultural Law Review. She is the "open ear" for law students on a daily basis--students seeking advice on course options, career planning, writing problems, law review articles, and personal crises. She never refuses to help, and yet somehow manages to keep her classes up-to-date, innovative, and exciting.

Professor Richard Cartier teaches Civil Procedure and every other conceivable course on family law or mediation. He also operates the Regional Family Law and Mediation Center. Therein, he trains law students on a one-to-one basis to conduct peaceful mediation sessions on marital property distribution issues. The clinic has a nearly 90% success rate, thus helping to relieve the burdens on the courts. Rich is also the force behind the current effort to review the entire law school curriculum. In his spare time (I swear he doesn't sleep), he is one of SJCL's in-house computer gurus.

Professor Denise Kerner is well-known as the support brains behind the Small Claims Clinic which SJCL has operated for more than ten years; however, Denise's most important role is the backbone of the first-year research and writing program. I listen for hours from across the hall as she enthusiastically explains the concepts of case analysis over-and-over to student after student, using every different angle she can muster. I am endlessly amazed by her patience and inventiveness.

Over the last few years, Professor Larry Artenian has been called upon to teach the most diverse array of classes, ranging from Contracts to Remedies to Secured Real Property Transactions to Advanced Research and Writing. To his relief, this is the first year he has not had to invent a totally new class. Larry is an active participant (some say "lightening rod") in many committees, notably Curriculum and Admissions. He also did the Law School and me a great service by acting as inhouse counsel in the negotiation of the lease of the Clovis building.

Professor Jeff Purvis is the newest kid on the full-time faculty, teaching Constitutional Law, Business Organizations, and Constitutional Law seminars. He and I carry the proud title of "Draconian Graders." Jeff has seized the reins of the Library Committee, attempting to create a plan for the development of the library over the years in a manner that would position SJCL to seek ABA accreditation someday should we so desire. Jeff is also our alternative computer guru.

A list of the adjunct faculty that have made major contributions over the years would be staggering. Justice Ardaiz has taught for 11 years, serving for most of those on the Faculty Committee and/or Board of Trustees. Judge Caeton has taught for 18 consecutive years, the record among currently active faculty. Doug Noll has been a long-time advocate for writing skills spending interminable hours assisting



"It's positive to see so many San Joaquin graduates practicing in the community and providing high quality legal service," Deborah says.

"I love teaching," Deborah says. "It's a stimulating, challenging experience. I feel that it's important for people to know the legal system and laws."

Judy Wise, a San Joaquin College of Law Paralegal Program graduate, was one of only six individuals in the entire state to earn the California Advanced Specialist-Civil Litigation designation in the Fall of 1995. This was the first time the exam had been administered.

In 1994, through the combined efforts of the members of the California Alliance of Paralegal Associations (CAPA) and National Association of Legal Assistants (NALA), a new testing mechanism was proposed to demonstrate significant experience and advanced proficiency in California law. SJCL law alumnus, James Michael Petrucelli ('89), and local CAPA representative, Debra Anderson (PA '86), were instrumental in the development of the California Advanced Specialty Examination. Those who are successful earn the designation of CAS, California Advanced Specialist. The first administered exams were offered in the areas of Civil Litigation, Real Estate and Business Organizations.

The CAS Exam is in addition to the examination developed in 1975 by NALA for paralegals to earn the designation of CLA, Certified Legal Assistant. In some parts of the Country, having the CLA status is as important as a diploma or certificate showing formal paralegal training at an institution of higher learning. The prerequisites to qualify for the two-day exam are fairly stringent, and the exam is difficult. As a nationally administered exam, it tests general skills and knowledge but is more focused on federal practice. There are only a handful of CLA's in the Fresno area including some San Joaquin Paralegal Program graduates. Throughout California, the number of paralegals who have taken the CLA exam is relatively small.

Judy, and her husband, Michael Wise, attended the SJCL Paralegal Program together and graduated in the 1993 Fall class. Judy worked in a couple of different positions before finding her niche at the Madera City Attorney's Office. She is a dedicated community member, mother of three, and active as the Secretary of the San Joaquin Association of Legal Assistants. Judy has also participated in SJCL's Paralegal Program Informational Forums. She contributes in every possible way for the betterment of the paralegal profession. We wish to congratulate Judy on her accomplishment and her example of excellence.
